

# Will x Going to

- Simple Future has two different forms in English: "will" and "be going to." Although the two forms can sometimes be used interchangeably, they often express two very different meanings. These different meanings might seem too abstract at first, but with time and practice, the differences will become clear. Both "will" and "be going to" refer to a specific time in the future.

## ➤ Use of **WILL**

### 1) Future actions happen without the speaker's intention

The sun **will shine** tomorrow.

### 2) Predictions, assumptions

I think Jason **will arrive** in Paris at 6 pm.

### 3) Spontaneous actions

Hang on! I **'ll have** a word with you.

**Will = 'll**

**Will not = Won't**

## ➤ Use of **Going to (to be + going to)**

### 1) planned actions in the future

We **are going to** sing at the party.

### 2) You are certain that sth. is going to happen in the future.

Look at this car! It **is going to** crash into the yellow one.

**will/going to-future**
